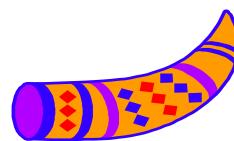
## High Holiday Tickets

## A High Holiday Message from Rabbi Aronson

### It Should be a Good Year... Knock on Wood!

Elul 5766/Tishrei 5767



Life is precarious. What we have and enjoy one minute – good health, family, material well-being – can easily disappear the next. Because we know this truth, many Jews adhere to certain superstitions passed down for generations that seek to fool the forces that cause evil to befall us. For example, we often will talk about what makes us most happy and proud and then without taking a breath utter “*Kayn a-hora!*,” which means “May we be protected from the evil eye (lest we jinx our good fortune)” and then quickly find some wood to rap our knuckles on.

It is not only in our superstitions that we take note of the delicate balance of abundance and famine, life and death; our liturgy, too, exhorts us to take note, especially around the High Holy Days. As we imagine ourselves standing before the Judge of Judges during the Days of Awe, we tremble in fear of being written out of the Book of Life in the upcoming year. We ask “Who shall live and who shall die?” knowing full well that the answer remains a mystery.

It is because we live in this state of not knowing what the future will bring that we recite Psalm 27 twice a day from the beginning of the month of Elul, which precedes Rosh Hashana, until Sukkot. In Psalm 27 the psalmist begins by proclaiming, “The Lord is my light and my help. Whom shall I fear?” and then continues to affirm his unwavering faith that no matter what happens, G-d will be there for him, protecting him and helping him defeat his enemies.

But the psalmist’s tune changes in the second half of the psalm. “O Lord, hear my voice when I call... Hide not from me, reject not Your servant.” Now, the psalmist is sufficiently unsure that G-d will always be there that he prays for G-d to stand by him in times of need.

How curious! If the psalmist is so confident that G-d will always be by his side, why the need to beseech G-d not to abandon him? Why not take G-d’s protecting presence as a given? Apparently, the psalmist really isn’t so sure that when danger threatens, G-d will always be there to help him prevail!

Thus is the paradox of the Days of Awe: We proclaim our faith in the King of Kings, our father and protector, yet we know that life throws us curve balls, that ill fortune befalls us despite our faith. In times of uncertainty or despair, we reach beyond ourselves and search for the Divine Presence that will pull us through. Often the Presence is there. Many times, however, it seems to elude us.

How can the psalmist live with both certainties: the certainty of G-d’s presence and the certainty that sometimes it feels that G-d isn’t at all present? He answers his own question – and thereby provides us with solace – “One thing I ask of the Lord, for this I yearn: to dwell in the House of the Lord all the days of my life...” The psalmist owns up to the fact that for him to feel safe all his days, it’s not that G-d must always be with him, but that he must always be with G-d. He must “behold G-d’s beauty, pray in G-d’s sanctuary.”

A Chassidic master taught, “G-d dwells where you let G-d in.” Even in times of uncertainty and despair, even when bad things happen to us, we can deal with our *tzurris*, our heartache, if not overcome our circumstances entirely, by clinging to the reality of G-d's loving presence in our lives, however we feel that presence. The objective reality may not change, but the knowledge of G-d's presence brings peace and the ability to get through even the worst of times.

I look forward to bringing the New Year in with the Ahavath Israel community, knock on wood, as together we seek “to dwell in the House of the Lord” all the days of our lives.

My wife Beth, son Jacob, and I wish you “*Shana tova u-metuka!* A good and sweet year!”

### **Feeding the Hungry: “Mazon” and the Food Pantry**

“Mazon” offers a means of making a monetary donation to help feed the hungry. Through its program called “The Corners of Our Fields,” they channel donations to where they are needed, both on a local and non-local level. The program's name comes from the fact that farmers would harvest only the main parts of their fields, leaving the corners to be harvested by the needy. Envelopes for Mazon donations will be available in the lobby.

Food donations are also still being accepted for the Kosher Food Pantry. If you are unable to donate nonperishable food items, please request donation coupons and make a monetary contribution. The food bank always needs our help. All items marked as Kosher will be donated to the Kosher Food Bank. If any non-kosher items are donated they will go to the Ewing Food Pantry, so nothing will be wasted. Please help!

### **“Mitzvah Morning” Planned; Sponsors needed for “Break-the-Fast”**

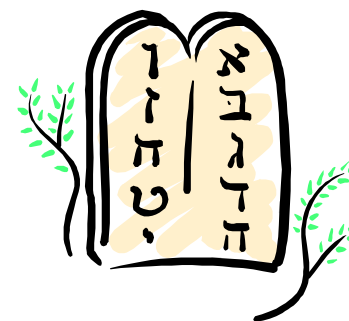

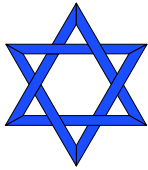
